As many of you will be aware Mrs Baker has been of on maternity leave. During the first part of this term she had her baby and is doing very well.


During this term we have said goodbye to both Miss White and Miss Forder who left the TA positions.

Community

As part of the school councils work we are having a new outdoor gym fitted on the field of the school. When pupils return after the easter break hopefully this should be fitted and ready for use.

This term KS3 pupils have been looking at the novel 'The Outsiders' by S.E. Hinton. A book written by a 15 year old girl, she covers topics about gangs, family dynamics, and the struggles teenagers can face. Pupils explored the book and film, creating posters and storyboards, creative writing, and more based on the book. They have recently looked at the theme of magic in Shakespeare plays including 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' and 'Macbeth'.

KS4 have been working on their GCSE English Language skills looking at extended writing of fiction and non-fiction, and more recently extract analysis and language techniques. We have been using Kahoot quizzes to build confidence with language techniques before writing exam style answers. For year 11, it's not long until their GCSE exams so we have been revising all of their content.



Maths

Older pupils — and those in Year 11 especially — have been honing their examination skills this term, in the run-up to examination season in a couple of months time. Pupils have been working on completing revision booklets and past parers, as a means of identifying where pupils strengths lie, and where more can be done to support them in their quest to gain the best possible grades at GCSE. Many Year 11 pupils have now identified their onward path upon leaving Pinetree, and of course things such as college places and apprenticeships will, on many occasions, be dependent on a certain level of success at GCSE in both maths and English. As such, we would urge all parents and carers of Year 11 pupils to encourage their youngsters to put as much effort as possible into preparing for these exams. Please contact the school if you have any questions or concerns.

At Key Stage 3, pupils have been measuring this term, with pupils using standard units of measure relating to (deep breath), length, area, volume, capacity, mass, time and money, to name but a few! Now that pupils have fine tuned their ability to tell the time using both the 12 and 24 hour clock, and using both analogue and digital equipment, they will never again have an excuse for being late!





Science

This term in Science the focus has been on metals, Space, and the universe. Pupil have shown an incredible amount of knowledge about the universe and some of the facts they know are extremely impressive. Pupils have learnt the different planets and other items that are part of the solar system. Pupils have also learnt about eclipses, phases of the moon, and learnt about individual planets and created different case studies on these.

KS4 have also continued preparation for their exams and have been working on completing the ELC and GCSE courses they are taking.

For the most part this term pupils have shown a high level of enthusiasm for the Science and have shared their knowledge both of metals, space and GCSE topics.



KS4 Art

In Art lessons this term we have been focusing on building a range of artistic skillsets through exam preparation to support sitting the 10 hour Art & Design GCSE exam at the end of April 2023. Pupils started the term by researching and exploring the chosen exam question 'Our World'. As the term progressed pupils created several artist studies and took part in a variety of creative, experimental and

KS3 Art

In Art lessons this term we have been focusing on building a range of artistic skillsets through the study of Abstract Art and artist Wassily Kandinsky. We have been learning about the use of colour, shape and composition and how these elements combined create art that is abstract. Wassily Kandinsky's art was inspired by music; pupils have used the same stimulus to inspire their artwork when drawing with oi

All pupils produced A2 sized paintings that were inspiring, creative and beautiful to look at. These are now proudly displayed in our reception area. During tutor time we continue to use Lyfta as a way to explore the world around us. Pupils have been to a variety of different place around the world to discover how others live.

We have also enjoyed visits from the police to help pupil understanding of the different dangers of the world. They have spoke about a variety of issues from assaults to knife crime. We have also experienced visits to to the Museum and planning a trip to a local library.

We have also had an array of assemblies to focus on the british values and to promote britishness. We have had assemblies on New Years, Chineese New Year, why we have laws and rules and what makes a good friend. We also had a series of assemblies on LGBTQ+.

Food Technology

Year 7

This term we have been making various dressings and sauces and also following a topic based on the theme of survival. Pupils have been looking at different sauces and dressings to match specific meals. They have also looked at the different consistency of sauces. Additionally, pupils have been thinking of quick and easy food products which can be made using produce found in the wild or which can be cooked on trangias (small, portable cookers) or open fires.







KS4

This term pupils have been studying for their Home Cooking Skills Qualification. The majority of pupils in Year 10 and 11 have completed their written coursework and are now in the process of completing the practical side of the qualification.








Creativity and Emotional Literacy

In Life Skills lessons this term pupils have been on several trips to understand the history and culture of Thetford. They visited The Ancient House Museum, The Priory, Castle Park, Barnham Common and Thetford Town Centre. These trips helped them gain inspiration to be able to collaboratively create several largescale art murals; these are to be displayed on the external walls of the school.

Bidwell


A part of our life skills lessons pupils had the opportunity to go to the Bidwell Centre. The resilience and perseverance group finished their survival unit with a trip to the Bidwell centre. The Bidwell Centre is a Scout and Guiding centre in Thetford where you can get the full outdoor adventure experience. Pupils on the trip got the chance to create a camp fire, play games as a group, and cook bangers on the fire. I think there may even have been some camp fire songs. Many of our pupils had not experienced many outdoor learning experiences and have not had the chance to enjoy nature. On their return the pupils had thoroughly enjoyed the experience and were looking forward to going again.



Pupils in the communication and oracy life skills group had the opportunity to go to Norwich Market. This was part of a series of lessons around budgeting and money management. Pupils had been asked to plan a meal of their choice on a budget. Pupils had to research recipes, source ingredients and remain in the constraints of the budget set. Once planned pupils went to Norwich Market to buy tier ingredients and experience life at a market, which many pupils stated they hadn't done before. Pupils were given their money and had to find and buy their items. Pupils were expected to approach and interact with the market trader and purchase their items independently. Most of the pupils managed this and incredibly mature during the experience. Once the hard work was done, their was time to explore the other shops and enmittes that the centre of Norwich has to offer.

On the return to school in the following lessons pupils cooked up their recipes and enjoyed earing the locally sourced produced. Pupils commented in the sense of satisfaction felt from doing everyday themselves. There was some wonderful food cooked from steaks to curries and the pupil's certainly enjoyed eating them.

On Wednesday 22nd March 2023 we celebrated Easter by having a Theme day around the holiday. We looked into why we celebrate Easter in assembly and the traditions of the holiday. Many of our pupils only associate Easter with eating chocolate and bunnies so we wanted them to see the real reason behind the religious celebration.

Like all theme days we had a variety of activities of to celebrate and represent the celebration. There were 5 different subjects that put sessions of to ensure it was cross curricular. Art, Maths, English, PE and FT.


In Maths pupils completed Maths related Easter challenges in small teams and had to work together to complete them. Pupils tried hard to complete all the challenges and the majority saw success.

Pupils completed an Easter based quiz in English with a highly competitive competition between the pupils and staff and many of the pupils getting over competitive and some of the staff too.

In Art pupils were creating their own Easter based cards with eggs, chickens and other Easter themed accessories to stick onto the cards. The quality of the cards made was high and hopefully some of these will be making their way into your homes.

In PE pupils completed a series of Easter related challenges including egg and spoon races and team challenges. In FT pupils were making hot cross buns and showing their baking skills.

Overall pupils really enjoyed their day and got a lot out of the Easter sessions. We were able to break some misconceptions around the celebration and pupils have a better understanding of the holiday.



On 18th January we had a data themed day where pupils used their data in a variety of different ways across the curriculum. This is to demonstrate to pupils the positive way data can be used across the school and not just in Maths.

Like all theme days there was a cross curricular link and Art, English, Food Technology, PE and DT all contributed to the day putting their own take on data.

In Art pupils used their own 'data' (mainly their DOB) to create a collage portrait. This helped pupils understand how the composition of numbers, when arranged in a creative way can indeed create Art. The session was aimed to help pupils to understand how inspiration for Art is found in all areas of life. There was some incredible collages made and many are displayed in the school's front office.



In English pupils created lyrics/poetry based on numbers and patterns e.g. 4 lines per stanza. They experimented with applying their lyrics to different beats and time signatures, focusing on counting their beats and staying in time. For many of our pupils. The pupils really enjoyed the chance to make music and many came up with some interesting lyrics and beats.

In Food Technology pupils made a base for pizza. They each then selected ingredients for their pizza so all the ingredients added up to 1. For example ¼ pepper, ¼ onion, ½ cheese. Some of the good enough to sell.



In Design & Technology pupils used Tessellation to create a design with fabric. Pupils cut out their original shape and then sewed them in different position to use the tessellation. We got some lovely designs some of which are displayed in the front office



In PE pupils completed a Question of Sport – quizzes and interactive activities all using data. The pupils were able to show their knowledge of data in sport and many were surprised how much data you used in sport.



Overall the day was really successful with pupils and staff really enjoying the day. Pupils really gained knowledge of all the different places and ways in which you can use data.

Spotlight on careers

This term, like every term we have continued to put careers and the pupil's onward destination from us at the forefront. Although many of our pupils have already secured a post 16 destination, this hasn't affected our drive in raising the aspirations of both our Key Stage 3 and 4 learners. Last term the pupils had opportunity to attend a careers fair at Carrow Road, speak with apprenticeship teams and had visits from City College Norwich and West Suffolk College.

This term the pupils have had further opportunities to speak with agencies, colleges and employers about their onward journey. This term with have had a visit from the British Army who spoke to the pupils about what a career in the Army would like. The pupils who really engaged and enthused by the speaker. They were shocked at the number of careers that were available within the British Army. Having the opportunity to speak to an experienced soldier not only broke some misconceptions but also gave pupils another potential career option.

ASK career workshops

We have also had weekly sessions from the ASK programme which supports the pupils in information and guidance about apprenticeships. These have involved what an apprenticeship may look like, current opportunities, pay and terms of an apprenticeship, entry requirements and ways which pupils can sign up. Pupils really benefited from the information, advice and guidance received so far and many have not been aware of all the different opportunities that are available to pupils of their age.

Careers Fair

We were delighted to have the opportunity to take all of our students to the Norfolk Careers and Skills festival. Across the 2 days we took all pupils ranging from Yr 7 – 11. On both days the pupils had the opportunity to speak with employers, businesses and a host of different activities (and buy some ice cream). The pupils were excellent in getting involved in different activities and speaking with potential businesses and employers. Some of the pupils' highlights including a flight simulator, the VR headsets and grabbing the freebies on offer. Overall the pupils enjoyed the day and behaved well across the 2 days and were a credit to the school.

Also, you can contact your **local council** if you have concerns for the household around cost-of-living expenses. They can offer guidance, local food banks and help and advice for energy costs.
