History

Food Technology

Year 7

This term we have been making various dishes from the different food groups such as cheese and onion triangles, and pizza pittas with added fibre. The aim of the module is to teach pupils the importance of eating all aspects of the Eatwell Plate for a balanced diet. Additionally, pupils have been looking at how we cook different kinds of eggs. We have been 'travelling around the world' to try foods from different countries.

Year 8 and 9

This term we have been making recipes which address different dietary needs, allergies, and intolerances. This teaches the pupils that in all walks of life they may be required to prepare or make food for other people rather than just for themselves. We have also been looking at cultures and food from different countries.

Year 10 and 11

This term pupils have been making different pastry products from millefeuille, using puff pastry, to quiche or Cornish pasty using short crust pastry.

Pupils have also been using 'summer' as our topic and using the outside BBQ to prepare food items, such as marinating chops or kebabs.

Computing

Last half term pupils across KS3 and KS4 worked on making their own Kahoot quizzes based on topics of their choice. Kahoot allows a competitive quiz to be played across devices and the pupils enjoy using this in lessons. Now they have had a chance to research and make their own! The topics have been varied from 'The Pinetree Quiz' to cars to many random mixtures of topics. One pupil even made a 100-question quiz!

This half term pupils are exploring 3D modelling - looking at the history of the computer technology involved and using an online programme to make their own 3D models.

Life Skills

Resilience and Perseverance

This term pupils have been learning how to fend for themselves in the 'wild'. They have learned how to put up a tent and cook on an open fire. Pupils have completed an Introduction to first aid. They have also learned about the local area; this included taking part in some cycling in the local woodland. To build pupil confidence we have organised competitive activities and developed the pupils' social skills through trips such as bowling and the zoo.





Communication and Oracy

In our Life Skills sessions this year, pupils have once more considered the cost of living crisis and discovered new ways to both eat and entertain themselves at no great cost. They have created recipes from scratch, bought key ingredients from Norwich market, and developed their own games to play that are fun and don't cost the earth.




Creativity and Emotional Literacy

In Life Skills lessons this term pupils have been on several trips to understand the history and culture of Thetford. They visited The Ancient House Museum, The Priory, Castle Park, Barnham Common, and Thetford Town Centre. These trips helped them gain inspiration to be able to collaboratively create several large-scale art murals; these are to be displayed on the external walls of the school.







As part of life skills this term, some pupils had the chance to go bowling at Mr G's in Brandon. They had a fantastic time and only a few bowling balls got stuck... Some great scores were achieved and pupils enjoyed the competitive challenge. It was great to see how well the pupils represented themselves and the school at the bowling alley, showing politeness, and excellent turn-taking skills. An experience of tenpin bowling was also beneficial to the pupils' Maths skills. 10 is a triangular number, don't you know....





On the 28th June pupils who achieved 90% attendance and above attended the Royal Norfolk Show. Despite the pouring rain, pupils were in good spirits as they departed school at 9.00. We were extremely lucky that there was minimal traffic and we arrived at 10.00. On arrival the pupils and supporting adults were separated into their different groups and were sent in different directions by the trip leader, with the aim of coming back with some stories. Some pupils explored the sports arena and food court trying all the different samples on offer. It was decided the best food stall was the crisps stall with all their different varieties

At 12:00 the pupils met up to swap stories and have some lunch before going off again. The pupils were being enthusiastic and sharing some exciting stories about their day so far. The pupils were still in good spirits and were enjoying the day despite the boggy fields.

Pupils then went to find the exciting stalls they hadn't yet been to; this included a trip to the army and R.A.F stall, taking part in problem solving activities and getting through a spider's web.

At 14.00 pupils returned to the minibus with all the 'free stuff' they had collected throughout the day. These included a football, painted vinyl disc and lots of pens and bands. Overall the day was a huge success, the pupils had a very enjoyable day and showed an excellent attitude, really embracing the experience.



Northgate Library

As part of our on-going enrichment of the curriculum and promotion of reading, a group of pupils were invited to visit the Northgate Library following lots of positive comments about the books and opportunities available. Mr Rice, Miss Townsend, and Mrs Warren took 3 pupils to the mainstream school to visit the library. Whilst there the pupils acted with politeness and respect.

The pupils looked through an array of books often stopping to look more closely at several chosen books. A Year 8 girl got engrossed in a fictional novel, whilst Year 7 and 8 boys shared books on the world wars and how incredible a time this was. The boys also shared stories they had been told by grandparents/great grandparents.

Overall, the pupils really enjoyed the visit and it was pleasing to see them leaving clutching different books they were returning to school with. I was extremely proud of the pupils who showed enthusiasm and courteousness throughout.











As part of our Life Skills lessons pupils had the opportunity to go to the Bidwell Centre. This term the final round of pupils went who had not already been. While at the Centre pupils got the chance to create a camp fire, play games as a group, and cook bangers on the fire. I think there may even have been some camp fire songs. So many of our pupils have suggested they enjoyed the trip and have eaten far too many sausages. The pupils returned smelling of camp fire smoke and full bellies. The pupils loved the opportunity to be out and at 1 with nature.

Kickstart the moped hire charity

As part of our commitment to giving pupils opportunities within different industries we had the pleasure of the charity Kick-start spending the day with us at school. They provide mopeds and scooters for young people who need transport. As part of the visit pupils were able to look at the bikes, dismantle them, put them back together whilst also learning about the bikes along the way.

Two different bikes were brought along; a modern day electric bike and an older petrol bike. Pupils learned the difference between the two. They looked into the running costs of the these, part availability, and some basic differences in terms of speed, functions, and ride style. During the talks the pupils were full of questions and wanted to find out a range of information about the bikes. The favourite was definitely the electric bike with all the modern day features.

Throughout both the talks and practical sessions pupils were incredibly engaged, polite, and full of questions. The pupils were keen to learn about the bikes and showed real enthusiasm to learn.

My favourite part was hearing a year 10 female pupil say: "that was great, I didn't expect to like that".

We really thank Dale and the kick-start team for their time and knowledge.



Careers theme day

On 28.6.23 we had a whole school Careers day focused on pupils understanding future careers and looking into what skills would be required for when they go into the World of work

Like all theme days different departments contributed to the day organising either visitors into the school and putting on activities demonstrating a future career.

In PE pupils were utilising and working on skills they would need in the work place, such as teamwork, communication and leadership. Pupils were given a talk around future careers Pathway and this was supported by information supplied by DESA football academy who couldn't be in attendance on the day.

In order to work on these skills pupils completed a series of individual and team challenges. Pupils had to "cross the river". Pupils had to set a time using problem solving skills both on their own then as a team, knowing one step in the river and they would be eaten. We then progressed on communication, leadership and tactical skills in capture the flag, where pupils have to steal the other teams flag. The majority of pupils were enthusiastic



In Food Technology we were privileged to be joined by RAF Honington. Four members of the team joined us with the military chefs sharing their skills and teaching the pupils new skills but also what a career could look like.

They supplied the tortillas, vegetables, and whole chickens. They showed the pupils how to fillet a chicken correctly, spoke about hygiene, and how to make sauces and gravy from the carcass of the chicken.

The pupils made some excellent tortilla wraps, experimented with fajitas seasoning, and tried new foods.

This all helps build skills in the kitchen and life skills. The pupils were so enthusiastic about the opportunity and had so much fun watching and learning from the experts. All the pupils felt like they had learnit new skills but also were full of

knowledge about the RAF. One year 10 boy commented "I didn't know you could be a chef in the RAF, I might do that". The pupils were also impressed by the skills the chefs had.

I would like to thank RAF Honington taking the time to spend with our young people.



Pupils also had the opportunity to explore journalism and photography and what a career in this field might look like. With pupils watching and writing match reports and pieces following sporting events. This showed the pupils there is a point to the work they complete in English. Pupil also began to plan what career paths they might choose, and why, also thinking about what skills they may need to make this happen.

For RSHE pupils had a talk from the St Giles Trust about many of the dangers in the world and what pupils can do to keep themselves and others safe. Although much of this content was hard to hear, pupils received this this information well and took a keen interest in the content.



VeloBuild"

This term pupils from Birch and Acorn have had the opportunity to build their own bikes through Velobuild. The project is organised by All Things Active – their aim is to give all young people the opportunity to have a bike and understand how to maintain it.

The bikes arrived with just a frame and the pupils were expected to make the rest of the bikes themselves. They begin by attaching wheels to the frame. Pupils then progress onto leading putting brakes and gears onto the bikes. Pupils have to make sure these are all tightened and ready for usage. Pupils are also shown how to maintain the bikes successfully. They practice repairing a flat tyre and how to make basic repairs or general maintenance to the bikes.

The final part of the project is test riding the bikes. The pupils need to make sure they are roadworthy and that they will not fall apart. The pupils took the bikes out onto the field to test ride them. This was the favourite part of the project for many.

The bikes from all pupils look excellent and the pupils are really proud of their efforts. The majority of pupils have already taken bikes home and are really pleased with them... One pupil even rides his to school every day.

During the project both groups acted in a really mature manner and tried really hard throughout the project. They showed enthusiasm throughout and got a lot out of the project with many pupils suggesting it was one of the best things they had done at school.

Three pupils from each subject who have made exceptional progress were nominated by teachers and invited to the event where senior trust staff, parents, and school staff all mingled to celebrate.


